County green lights planned aquatic center's construction

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GRIFFIN — Spalding County commissioners recently approved moving forward with constructing the planned aquatic center even though the low bid came in over budget.

Commissioners approved re-allocating \$6 million from the county's American Rescue Plan Act Funds for the aquatic center's construction.

with funds coming from 2016 Special Local Option Sales Tax proceeds.

County Manager Steven Ledbetter said the actual low bid the county received for its center's construction was \$10,072,000.

"This is substantially more than what was budgeted," Ledbetter said.

Ledbetter said the county has spent \$492,798.50 on engineering The original budget for the aquatic activity to prepare for the aquat-

center's construction was \$4,690,000, ic center's construction, leaving \$4,197,201.50 for use toward construction.

> "Its's going to be expensive, but we can use the ARPA funds to supplement the construction (cost) of the aquatic center," Ledbetter said.

> Spalding County has received \$6.47 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds and is expected to receive a total of nearly \$13 million in ARPA money, according to Spalding County reports.
