Incident occurs in school parking lot

The Spalding County Sheriff's Office is investigating a Monday afternoon shooting in the parking lot of Beaverbrook Elementary School, which left one person injured.

According to Spalding County Sheriff Darrell Dix on the scene, the injured man was taken to WellStar Spalding Regional Hospital and was

being prepared to be flown to the Atlanta Medical Center.

The incident reportedly involved two adults and one child. The child was not injured, Dix said.

Deputies and investigators were at WellStar Spalding Regional Hospi tal talking to a person who stated he was shot in Beaverbrook's parking lot, according to SCSO information. Investigators also talked with school

Dollar General celebrates grand opening Saturday

The Dollar General Distribution Center celebrated its grand opening Saturday with its employees, their families and local dignitaries.

The grand opening of the 1,001,234 square-foot facility on the Spalding and Butts county line included bounce houses, face painting, gifts for employees, catered lunch and a ribbon-cutting by company execu-tives, who also served the lunch to the employees. Mario Tort, the senior director of the Jackson Distribution Center, said "500 new careers were created at this distribution center." The "state-of-the-art facility," he

said, "is pretty amazing. But it is our people that make this place work. You are Dollar General's competitive advantage in this area," Tort told the employees.

He's served in similar positions at other Dollar General distribution centers, but said, "we built the best team here in Jackson. I'm excited to cel-

ebrate with you here today." Dollar General Senior Vice Presi-dent of Global Supply Chain Mike Kindy said, "I'm very excited. I'm pleased to say you've adapted to our

process." Kindy said, from the day the distribution center began receiving, it has supported about 750 stores in the

Southeast. "I'm really excited you brought your families to enjoy our grand open-ing. We are one big family," he said.

He also provided from statistics about the building, which will hold nearly 1,000 pallets, which from end to end would go from Jackson to Marietta. The distribution center is protected by more than 12,000 sprinkler heads, and the 400,000-gallon water

reservoir tank for the fire sprinkler system, he said, holds enough water for every person in Jackson to the daily recommended volume of water for 160 days.

staff and processed a crime scene where the shooting occurred.

Dix said that even though the shooting took place in the school parking lot while an awards cer-emony was being conducted inside Beaverbrook, the shooting does not appear to be schoolrelated at this time. No students or school staff members were reportedly targeted in the shoot-

"The students are safe and not in danger. School was dismissed as normal," Dix said.

Since there are two or three differing accounts of the incident being reported, Dix said deputies are actively investigating how and why the shooting occurred.

Griffin-Spalding County School System spokeswoman,

Laura Beaber, issued the following statement, "Beaverbrook Ele-mentary School administrators are cooperating with law enforcement as they continue their investigation on campus. The safety and security of students, staff and parents remains our top priority and we are grateful for the Sheriff's Department's immediate response to this matter."
