

each year and provide monthly financial statements within 30 days of each calendar month. The contract obligates both

the city and county to each fund half of the anticipated shortfall in revenues of the approved airport budget. The city and county also agree to pay half each of the local match of the Airport Capital Improvement Program for projects funded the Federal Aviation Administration or Georgia Department of Transportation, so long as those are included in the approved fiscal year budget.

The county's portion of the funding for the airport would be above and beyond what the county has to pay in lease fees for the Sheriff's Office hanger and for Airport Road Park. The contract commences July 1, 2013, and ends June 30, 2023, unless the parties mutually agree in writing to an earlier termination.

Both the city and county also approved two agreements with Michael Baker Jr., Consulting Firm to provide administrative services for grants and for the acquisition of land adjacent to

the airport, the old Hangar One Apartments owned by James McLendon. The building burned down last year but the owner is not allowed to rebuild because of the proximity of the building to the end of the airport runway.

The Federal Aviation Administration determined that to be hazard to safe navigation of the airport along with a shed and trees on the site. The cost is 90 percent reimbursable as part of the airport's 5-year capital improvement plan, which was also approved with the change by both the city and county. Airport Director Robert Mohl

explained "there are specific hoops we have to jump through," for the land purchase, "and the city will front the money for the purchase, once a price has been agreed upon with the owner."

Miller asked about the other property in violation out there. Mohl said. "there is some leeway as we are waiting to move, but we will need to address it and acquiring the first one may allow us some horse trading, if you will, to swap with the other.

Asked about the impact of A.Z. Kelsey's relatively low graduation rate on the systemwide numbers, Burrell said there is no frustra-

"When we opened A.Z. Kelsey, we knew we were pulling in students who were already behind," she said. "A.Z. Kelsey helps us reach students who may previously not have graduated at all."

As for plans to further increase the school system's graduation rate, Burrell said both Griffin High and Spalding High will continue the work of their ninth-grade academies. With high school students historically being the most likely to drop out in ninth grade, the academies and their mode of scheduling will help students stay on track, she said.

Pike County came in highest with a graduation rate of 86.79 percent, though the county has only one high school. Second was Fayette County with a 85.53 percent graduation rate, followed by Henry County at 75.54 percent and Butts County at 67.31 percent. Clayton County had the lowest graduation rate at 53.61 percent.
